Hurricane Ida Relief

Serving Individuals Impacted

"Thank you from the bottom of my heart. You are a blessing to my family. We lost everything in Bay St. Louis, and your generosity is a Godsend."

The note above, written by a family in line at a recent food distribution for individuals impacted by the storm sheltering in Mobile, Alabama, was handed to a staff member as they loaded up a car with food and water. The feelings that day resounded as staff encountered weary travelers displaced by the storm. Many were seeking refuge in the area until they received the green light to return home. uncertain what they would face when that day arrived. Staff and volunteers loaded up car after car, packed full with luggage and family belongings. Many families sheltering together expressed their gratitude for access to food when so many other unknowns remained.

In late August, Hurricane Ida made landfall in south Louisiana, largely impacting our Mississippi service area and sending many of our neighbors to the west to seek temporary shelter in our central Gulf Coast region.

Sharon Tatum oversees the food pantry at Pleasant Ridge United Methodist Church in Stateline, MS. This church in Greene County is no stranger to storms, having served the community after Hurricane Katrina 16 years ago. After Hurricane Ida tore through Louisiana and Mississippi, Sharon got to work making sure the people in Stateline who turned to the church continued to have access to nutritious food.

"Thanking you for blessing our community," said Sharon. "People were overwhelmed and excited. They couldn't stop coming up to me, rolling their windows down to say how thankful they were. From the bottom of my heart, I thank you so much for thinking of us. I love being able to serve people. We are in a poor rural area, and we are in need of so much but don't have the financial capability, just God! Thank you!"

Since Hurricane Ida hit, Feeding the Gulf Coast has distributed nearly 776,000 pounds of food and emergency supplies to families impacted by the storm, including 19,000 pounds to individuals seeking refuge in our service area until they are able to return home.

armen* never had trouble affording a turkey for Thanksgiving. She could never imagine needing the help, until it happened. "It's been a rough couple of months for me," she said.

That's because when the hospital she worked at started construction and closed a number of patient rooms, the staff was restructured and she lost her job. Luckily, she was offered another position – but with significantly fewer hours. "My funds are pretty low right now," Carmen said. "Losing hours is hard, especially around the holidays when there are a lot more expenses to worry about."

But Carmen and her family will not have to worry about whether they can afford a turkey or sides for Thanksgiving because they are getting all of that from a special holiday food distribution. "This is a tremendous blessing," Carmen said. "Before I lost my job, I told my family I was going to have Thanksgiving dinner at my house for the first time. It's pretty huge to have the food. It's up to me and my sister to keep the family united and Thanksgiving is a great time to bring everyone together. This food helps us do that."

As Thanksgiving approaches, many of us look forward to everything the holiday brings. It is a chance to gather with friends and family, make memories, and give thanks around the table.

Map the Meal Gap

Hunger is prevalent throughout the communities we serve, and yet it is often hidden from view. To better address hunger, we must know where it resides.

A new study recently released by Feeding America shows that household budgets were seeing further strain despite improvements in overall food insecurity rates before the pandemic. Map the Meal Gap is the only study that provides local level estimates of food insecurity and food costs across the United States and has been produced by Feeding America for the last 11 years. In Feeding the Gulf Coast's service area, the food insecurity rate is 15.3%, equating to 350,370 individuals, including 101,210 children, along the central Gulf Coast who struggle with hunger at some point in the year.

This year's study, which provides data for 2019, shows a widening gap for households struggling to get by ahead of the COVID-19 pandemic. Rural counties are likely to experience the highest rates of food insecurity. Additionally, the study finds that many people who live in food-insecure households are likely ineligible for SNAP and other federal nutrition programs, meaning they are caught between earning enough to afford nutritious food year-round and qualifying for assistance programs.

Food insecurity is a measure defined by the USDA as lack of access, at times, to enough food for an active, healthy life for all household members. The 2021 release of Map the Meal Gap continued to show that all counties are home to people facing hunger. Mahama
